Saluti from the Board

On May 18, 2008, the Tontitown Historical Museum will celebrate Arkansas Heritage Month. This year's theme is Arkansas's Political Heritage: The People Rule. During the Tontitown event, the Museum will honor the many public servants who have served our city since 1909. The youth of our city will go through a mock political process of electing a Mayor from their ranks, culminating in an election. Anyone attending the event will be eligible to vote. The candidate with the most votes will assist Mayor Joe Edgmon during the June City Council meeting.

Next year Tontitown will celebrate its centennial. Tontitown was incorporated in 1909, with Father Pietro Bandini serving as the first mayor. While the Italian population of Tontitown was learning English, Father Bandini was also teaching them about the privileges of being an American, and about the state of Arkansas — its history, constitution, and the laws by which it was governed. The state of Arkansas's motto is Regnot Populus – *The People Rule*, and it struck a cord with this small group of Italians. A proud people, they studied for their citizenship papers and learned how important it was to become involved in the political process.

Tontitown has a colorful political history. The Italian landowners did not understand the need to pay their taxes on newly acquired land by a given date. One year in the early 1900's, while Father Bandini was away on business, the taxes fell due. Returning home, Father Bandini learned the taxes had not been paid, and their land was to be auctioned off from the steps of the Court House. Paying the delinquent taxes he requested leniency for the landowners, who would be pressed to pay the penalty on overdue taxes. The judge was not

sympathetic to his request. Returning to Tontitown he informed the people they had to pay the tax penalty, and their only recourse would be to vote against the judge who was running for re-election. They listened to his advice, and the judge lost the election. The new citizens from Tontitown learned the importance of their vote. On another occasion, a Tontitown correspondent to the *Springdale News* wrote that the election on the previous Tuesday had received a poor turnout. He remarked that for those who did not vote, there was to be no criticism on how the elected ran the city.

For Italians of Tontitown, love of the soil and the acquisition of land are like the air they breathe. Most of Tontitown's original land passes from one generation to another. As custodians and caretakers of this land — even though this generation earns a living in almost every field of endeavor, the land is truly where their hearts lay. As proud citizens of Tontitown, this new generation of Italians are accepting growth and welcoming old neighbors and new citizens to Tontitown, as they stretch their borders to this still thriving community.

This year the citizens of Tontitown will vote to elect a new President of the United States. Political years are both exciting and exasperating. Our votes are important. Participating in the political process, starting with small town politics to the highest level of government, the people from every walk of life have a voice with their vote. This privilege is what keeps our country free.

Tontitown Historical Museum Book Project

We continue to gather research on the early days of Tontitown for our book, *Tontitown: The First Twenty Years*. The process is much like putting together a jigsaw puzzle. We know many facts; but some don't quite fit together yet. The work is rewarding, yet very slow.

Recently, author Susan Young and Tontitown Museum Board members Frank Maestri and Mary Maestri Vaughan went to the Diocese of Little Rock to obtain copies of information from priest files. It was a very successful trip, uncovering letters from Father Bandini and other documents from the early 1900's. Below is a copy of a handwritten letter from Father Bandini to Bishop Fitzgerald, in March of 1903. Just imagine the mindset of these leaders as they worked to support their widespread congregations and communities.

Although we hoped to publish the book this year, now we know that goal was too ambitious. We will keep working and keep you posted on our progress, with a new goal of 2009. Thanks in advance for your help, support and patience in the book project.

St. Joseph's Church P. Bandini, Rector.

Tontitown, Ark., March 10th, 1903

Rt. Rev. Bishop E. Fitzgerald Little Rock, Ark.

Rt. Rev. dear Bishop,

I received your favor and your check for \$25.00, and I thank your Lordship most sincerely, as your help came just in time. We have at present the most miserable weather, the mud is so deep that we cannot get out of the house, and yet it is raining more or less every day. Farmers begin to weary about their garden, as they have had no chance to plant any seed.

Harrison and all the vast country E. and N. and south of Eureka is supposed to be attended by Eureka. I have myself quite a territory N. and W. of Fayetteville, but there are no places to attend except few times in summer Siloam Springs. I went until now 3 or 4 times a year to Sunnyside, but I hope a priest will be stationed there very soon. Two Italian priests from Italy well-recommended by their Bishops are ready to come down at any moment, only I wish the people of Sunnyside would give me some security that they would pay the honorary to the priest, and then he would come down at once. What your Lordship think would be the best to insure and arrange this affair, so that we may have the priest down in a very short time?

We travel these roads of Italian names Ardemagni, Mantegani, Bariola, too! This land where our ancestors worked long ago This road where gravel once was.


Maestri, Morsani, Mussino, and Granata Do we still have family on this original land? This land where the hope of prosperity came true My hope is for descendants to be prosperous.

Tontitown Genealogy ... My passion and a labor of love

Ciao! Let me introduce myself. I'm Jan McQuade Sturm, great-granddaughter of Albano and Agnes Maestri. I'd like to share some questions that I often receive about my passion of many years – Tontitown Genealogy.

How did you become interested in genealogy for Tontitown?

When my grandfather passed away, I inherited his desk which contained many small scraps of newspaper. I was quite curious that much of this information, marriage, birth and death announcements and obituaries, related to families from Tontitown. While working on my own family tree, I discovered very quickly that those 40 or so original families of Tontitown intermarried. I found it would be easier to develop a family history on each of the families in order to determine who was who.

How much data have you actually collected?


Currently in Tontitown Genealogy there are over 3,600 individuals, and of these 1,212 marriages, spanning 10 generations with 840 different surnames.

And this is all generated from Tontitown?

Yes. Much of this includes information on parents, siblings and children in Italy and throughout the United States, as well as data on immigration, census, vital records, military service, newspaper articles, letters, wills and probate, court documents and much, much more.

What do you plan to do with this information? Will we ever see a book?

Ultimately to have this information available to future generations for their own family tree research would be ideal. Where that information would be located is still to be determined. Most likely it will be through the Tontitown Historical Museum and/or the Shiloh Museum of Ozark History.

As for a book, I have for many years thought that yes, that would be the case. However, the information is constantly being updated. I do know that additional updated editions could be added in the future, but the key is to find a way to protect private information of individuals who are still living. And, "where do you draw the line?" is a tough one to answer. I've made good contacts with almost every family. Once this is accomplished, I'll be in a better position to determine how to get the information out to all those who are interested.

What if someone has just a simple question or wants to contribute information on their family, how would they go about contacting you?

I have a wonderful resource and it is available only to Tontitown families. It is the website www.tontitown.org, and it is password protected, only available to those who are prescreened and have contributed their own family information.

I've been on board with the Polenta Smear since the beginning and plan to be there this year as well. I encourage everyone to stop by, see my research and check that the information I have on your family is correct.




